# Mayor goes behind the scenes at Jacob's bakery

The global snacking brand behind some of the UK's most loved treats, pladis, welcomed the Mayor of Oadby and Wigston, Cllr Samia Haq to the Jacob's bakery in Wigston, Leicestershire last week. Cllr Haq joined employees to learn about the exciting work that goes into creating some of Britain's favourite biscuits, as the Council continues to build close relationships with local businesses.

The factory on Canal Street in Wigston has been baking biscuits for 123 years. Factory General Manager Brian Jones gave the Mayor a tour of the site, which produces 19,000 tonnes of biscuits every year - equivalent to 1,500 double decker buses.

Cllr Samia Haq, Mayor of Oadby and Wigston, said: "It was a privilege to visit the factory yesterday and to hear the optimism from the management team of growth and job opportunities.

"The site in South Wigston with its pioneering technology and creativity is growing from strength to strength and is an integral part of the Borough's economic development. As a council we are committed to ensuring a good working relationship and that it continues to prosper. My sincere thanks to the management and staff for making the visit possible."

Brian Jones, Wigston Factory General Manager pladis, UK&I, said: "We were delighted to take the Mayor behindthe-scenes to reveal the sheer scale of our baking operations, as well as the hundreds of fantastic people that work exceptionally hard to create these much-loved treats. We look forward to working ever more closely with the Mayor and the Council as we continue to grow."

As many as 700 employees work to bake biscuits 24 hours a day during the busiest times of year, making it one of the largest employers in the area.

# Moving your recycling to wheeled bins

At its meeting on 24 April, 2018, Oadby & Wigston Borough Councillors approved proposals to move to wheeled bins for the collection of kerbside recycling. This decision forms part of the Council's wider plans to protect and improve services to residents.

#### Oadby & Wigston Borough Council Leader, Cllr John Boyce and Cllr David Carter explained the decision:

"Whilst the move from disposable recycling bags to wheeled recycling bins is earlier than anticipated, it is a necessity for the Council.

"We want our Borough to recycle as much as possible, reduce the amount of waste that goes to landfill and minimise the litter that can be caused by using recycling bags, and evidence from our waste consultation in 2017, along with feedback to the Council through the Customer Service Centre is that our residents are receptive to the introduction of wheeled bins over bags, whilst keeping our weekly collections.

"So, by keeping our recycling collection weekly and moving to bins, it will significantly reduce the amount of plastic the Council uses and make it easier for our residents to co-mingle their recycling, increasing the amount we recycle and reduce costs."

#### Important things to remember:

- Every household will receive a 240 litre (unless pre-opted for 140 litre) wheeled bin with a brown lid by the end of July, 2018
- Items that can be recycled are not changing
- Weekly collections will continue and your collection day will remain the same
- Use your wheeled recycling bin as soon as you receive it and recycle as much as possible

The Council is no longer collecting textiles, clothes and shoes at the kerbside, and putting textiles into the recycling bins or bags can cause serious problems at the recycling facility. The material can get trapped and damage machinery, slowing down the recycling process.

Every year an estimated 300,000 tonnes of used clothing goes to landfill in the UK. The National "Love Your Clothes" campaign is dedicated to helping inspire and influence us to keep clothing out of the bin. The site **loveyourclothes.org.uk** offers advice on removing stains, mending and repairing clothes and upcycling items. It also offers ideas on how to swap or donate items of clothing.Alternatively, clothes suitable for re-use can be taken to your local charity shop, or recycled at the designated textile banks located across the Borough, see below, or the Recycling and Household Waste Site on Wigston Road, Oadby, LE2 5JE.

# 2018 Sport Relief Challenge -Wigston to Norderstedt

Between March 17-23, 90 Oadby and Wigston Borough Council employees raised money for Sports Relief, by collectively walking the 1 million steps (500 miles) it takes to get from the Council Offices in Wigston to the twinned town of Norderstedt in Germany.

Steps were recorded by a pedometer, smart phone app or fitness tracker, and participants were given the individual goal of achieving 5,000 steps a day. Amazingly the initial goal was reached after only two days and the team was able to eventually reach Timbuktu in Mali, after recording a brilliant 5,5129,65 steps (2750 miles).

Although the challenge was a fantastic way for individuals to get more physically active and improve their health, it also resulted in £591 being raised for charity.

### Key Achievement's

Of the ninety Council employees who took part in the challenge:

- 79 people walked over 35,000 steps (17.5 miles) in a week, which is up Mount Kilimanjaro
- 9 people walked over 100,000 steps (50 miles) in a week, which is up and down Mount Everest
- 26 people walked over 70,000 steps (35 miles) in a week, which is up Mount Everest, Mount Snowdon and Scaffell pike.

# Air quality in the Borough

The Council annually sets out an Annual Status Report on air quality across the Borough. This forms part of a review and assessment process required under the Environment Act 1995. The report is sent to the government as part of the National Air Quality Strategy.


Briefing papers on the Borough's Air Quality in 2017 were circulated to the Community Forums in February and March, 2018.

There are no Air Quality Management Areas, and no Air Quality Action Plans in force within the Borough. NO2 is the only pollutant affecting the Borough primarily caused by traffic with the A6, A5199 and other busy roads running through the Borough.

The Council, monitor Nitrogen Dioxide strategically across a network of 21 sites with passive diffusion tubes, with no exceedances of the National Air Quality Objectives in 2017.

Although there are no exceedences of the Air Quality objective in the area, the Council continues to look at measures to reduce air pollution, working with LCC Highways and the Councils Planning department to improve local air quality.

# Private Sector Housing and the law: What you need to know

The Government is introducing new housing legislation and has amended existing legislation, which will affect both tenants and landlords. The main changes in the legislation are set out below:

### New House in Multiple Occupation (HMO) requirements

From October 1, 2018 a property will be classed as a licesable HMO if it is shared by five or more persons, living as two families or more who are sharing a basic amenity (bathroom, kitchen, lounge). Landlords will be required to hold a licence issued by the Council. The current charge for a licence is £777.

The Government has announced that there will be no grace period for landlords, who should make their applications as soon as possible. Failure to register the property will incur additional costs and may lead to prosecution and repayment of rent.

### **Rent Repayment Orders**

A rent repayment order is an order made by the courts, which may require a landlord to repay a specified amount of rent. From April 6, 2017, this power was extended to cover all offences under the Housing Act 2004 and where evictions were secured by violence. With the extension of the HMO licensing scheme, rent repayment orders will apply to the following offences with effect from October 1, 2018:

- Failure to obtain a Licence for a House in Multiple Occupation
- · Failure to comply with an Improvement Notice served by the Council
- Failure to comply with a Prohibition Order served by the Council
- Breach of a banning order made under section 21 of the Housing and Planning Act 2016
- Using violence to secure entry to a property under section 6 of the Criminal Law Act 1977
- Illegal eviction or harassment of the occupiers of a property under section 1 of the Protection from Eviction Act 1977.
- A rent repayment order can only cover up to a maximum of 12 months.

### Rogue Landlords Register – what it means to landlords and tenants

Any individual or organisation that owns, lets or manages a home who has received; a banning order, committed a banning order offence; or received two or more civil penalties, will be placed on a public register. The landlord, letting agent or organisation will then be banned from receiving any monies from the rental of the property at any time, or from having any dealings with the property while they are on the register. The Council must also consider whether to pursue a Rent Repayment Order.

### Tenancy Deposits - The need for them and what happens if not in place

If you rent your property, your landlord must put your deposit into a government-backed tenancy deposit scheme (TDP) if you rent your home on an assured shorthold tenancy that started after April 6, 2007.

If the court finds your landlord hasn't protected your deposit, it can order the person holding the deposit to either repay it to you or pay it into a TDP scheme's bank account within 14 days.

The court may also order the landlord to pay you up to 3 times the deposit as damages.

### Retaliatory evictions - how and when?

For tenancies, after October 1, 2015, provisions were introduced to prevent retaliatory evictions. This means that a court will refuse to order your eviction if **all** of these apply:

- you complained to your landlord or letting agent in writing about a problem before you received a section 21 notice
- you complained to the local council because your landlord didn't take steps to fix the problem
- the council sent your landlord a notice telling them to make improvements or saying it will do emergency work

A section 21 notice served between the time of your written complaint and the Council issuing an improvement or emergency work notice will be treated as invalid.

A section 21 notice sent in the six months after your landlord received an improvement notice or an emergency work notice from the council will be invalid.

# **Brocks Hill's butterflies**

In summer, the busiest areas of Brocks Hill Country Park are the meadows and sunny woodland rides. Flowers are blooming and a multitude of insect species can be seen feeding and completing their life cycles. The country park provides a refuge for a variety of pollinators, including bumblebees, solitary bees, wasps, hoverflies, beetles, moths and butterflies.

The butterflies of Brocks Hill have been surveyed for ten years by a dedicated volunteer, David Foulds, who with the help of other survey volunteers has carried out weekly surveys in the country park throughout spring and summer. David has now completed the ten yearly report, allowing us to see how our butterflies are faring at Brocks Hill.

The most abundant butterflies at Brocks Hill are the Speckled Wood, Ringlet and Gatekeeper, while the rarest species are the Painted Lady, Essex Skipper and Small Copper.

In total, 22 butterfly species can be found at Brocks Hill and over the past decade, our butterfly numbers have increased by 11% - though this can be affected by weather conditions, so numbers are lower in years with wet summers.

The lowest number of butterflies seen was 759 in 2012 and the highest was 2,046 in 2009. 2017 saw 1,650 butterflies counted, with butterflies such as the Red Admiral, Comma and Small Tortoiseshell experiencing a good year.

All of this data feeds into the way the country park is managed. The meadows are cut in the late summer once the flowers have set seed, although some areas are left uncut until autumn to retain areas for butterflies still on the wing. By cutting and removing the hay, next year's plants can grow without being smothered and the meadows retain low nutrient levels that benefit flowers that can be outcompeted by vigorous grasses.

Many of our most beautiful butterflies such as the Peacock rely entirely on stinging nettles as their caterpillar's foodplant. At Brocks Hill, we retain areas of nettles especially for butterflies and lots of other invertebrates to thrive. The gardens around the centre are also planted with butterfly friendly flowers such as Buddleia, Geranium and Lavender.

Visit Brocks Hill on a warm, sunny day and see how many different butterfly species you can find.

# Swimming safety advice for the summer

Each year, millions of Britons jet off to sunnier climes and stay in accommodation with swimming pools. It is essential to consider a number of factors when booking your holiday to ensure you keep your young children safe around the water.

### Before you go:

- Consider enrolling your children in swimming lessons to help them learn this life-saving skill
- Check pool safety arrangements for where you're staying in advance
- Be cautious about booking private villas that don't have safety fencing

### While you're away:

- Always supervise children near water and keep a close eye on them when they're in the pool
- Be aware that children don't shout out for help when they're drowning
- Understand that inflatables are not a substitute for supervision or swimming ability

## Time for the beach

So, where is a safe place to swim? Young children should always be supervised when on the beach. Make sure you explain to your children that it's not safe to swim on their own in the sea and try to use lifeguarded beaches for added safety.

Remember, a beach with flags that are both red and yellow is a safe place to swim or use inflatables. However, a red-only flag is a sign for danger and means NO SWIMMING. Never go in the water when the red flag is flying, and always be aware that there may be hazards that you cannot see.

An individual, who has achieved success at a regional, national or international level; exceeded expectations in their sporting performance or made a significant difference to a team. (16+)

# J and S Day Service

Oadby & Wigston Borough Council and Leicester City Community Trust have been working in partnership with J and S Day Service to help support adults with a Dementia related illness and get them more physically active.

#### "I haven't seen my mum so active for so long"

Initially, a sports activities coach delivered 10 weeks of games, such as kurling, boccia and skittles, which were very well received by all the participants.

Not only did individuals benefit from the activities, but it was a great chance for the staff members to learn about delivering physical activities themselves, and the Council's Health and Leisure Team has since loaned equipment so J and S can continue to deliver daily sessions after the funded programme has finished.

### "I like the competition"

The programme has had a fantastic impact on the participants and has enabled individuals to gain a sense of achievement, interact as part of a team and reduce their anxiety – the sessions have become a memorable part of their week.

#### "I tell my wife I really enjoy the games we do"

It has also resulted in positive behaviours, which many of the participant's families haven't seen for a long time.

# Ain't no mountain high enough!

Jerome Eatough, from the Tesco Superstore in South Wigston set himself a mountain of a challenge when he flew out to East Africa last year, to climb the world's highest free-standing mountain – Mount Kilimanjaro.

The climb was in support of an education charity that Jerome became involved as part of his role as a Union Education Representative for Tesco. Jerome explains, "I joined Tesco's union USDAW in 1999, and became a Learning Representative six years ago, to fill a vacancy in my store. One aspect of our work as is that we are always on the lookout for learning providers to support any in store learning.

"We identified a need to better understand the needs of disabled customers, particularly those who were deaf or had a hearing impairment, so we sourced a learning provider of Makaton Sign Language at Birkett House School, just down the road from the store."

Over the following months, several workshops were organised for colleagues wanting to learn basic Makaton, and to better understand the dayto-day difficulties that deaf and hard of hearing customers have to face. These workshops were so successful that last year South Wigston Tesco was awarded the Makaton Charity Achievement Award, the first of its kind for any large supermarket in the UK.

It was this work with Birkett House School that prompted Jerome to climb Kilimanjaro for charity to raise money for the school, with help from his colleague, Betty Partridge.

Jerome: "I reached the summit on day seven of our climb. We had set out the previous evening at 11pm and climbed the final thousand metres by torchlight! I arrived at Uhuru Peak, exhausted, aching and elated, just as the dawn was breaking over the whole of Africa - the ultimate photo opportunity.

"I'd like to pass on a big 'thank you' to everyone who supported and sponsored us during this epic endeavour. With your help, Betty and I raised just under £2,500 for Birkett House School."

# Community and youth group grants

# Rotary Club of Oadby and Oadby Launde

# A tree for every Rotarian

As part of the International Initiative by Rotary to enhance the environment, The Rotary Clubs of Oadby and Oadby Launde worked together to plant 60 trees; one tree per member of the two clubs.

The planting was organised with help from Oadby & Wigston Borough Council and the Pride of the Borough Group. The site chosen was the large grass area at Hamble Green in Oadby and the whip trees were arranged in two groups of 30. The trees were supplied by the Woodland Trust and are an even mix of Rowan, Silver Birch and Wild Cherry.

It will be some time before the trees mature and the Council will manage the thinning out as they develop. Care has been taken to avoid any buildings being affected when the trees mature by carefully positioning individual plants. The Rotary Clubs are now organising some protective fencing to help protect the young trees while they establish.

### A focus on youth activities

For nearly 20 years, the Rotary Club of Oadby Launde has been involved in supporting Youth Speaks - the Rotary National Public Speaking competition for young people. Teams from local schools supported by the club have gained a wide range of skills, with many achieving high positions in the competition.

In February, the club sponsored students from Beauchamp College, who attended the National Peace Conference. Students, including Khushali Parmer, Maria Parra, Jack Houlihan, Bradley Taylor and Patrycja Poplawska (pictured below) were addressed by a range of academics and politicians dealing with all aspects of peace resolution.

Later the same month, the club sponsored local Boy Scout Michael Donaghey so that he could attend the Rotary Young Leadership Awards (RYLA), and in February, 140 students took part in the Technology Tournament, where they were tasked with building a launch pad capable of launching and recovering a rocket within very tight parameters.





### Support for our local library

The Rotary Club of Oadby Launde is set to work with the trustees of Great Glen Community Library, to develop the library as a voluntary community facility. The club plans to help the trustees in developing meeting facilities, IT and book resources and fundraising.

The initiative, which will be run by the club as a major community project has already donated £450 to furnish the newly created patio area for meetings and leisure reading. Both parties see this as a long-term partnership, with a significant further fund raiser in the offing.



The club's foundation officer, Barry Coleman, said, "With support from Rotary Foundation, we have been able to kick-start this initiative, and it fits well within Rotary's involvement in local communities."

Library trustee, Vernon George, added, "We look forward to developing a long-term partnership with the Rotary Club of Oadby Launde which will greatly enhance the community library."

If you give your waste to someone make sure they have a licence. It is your responsibility to make sure they dispose of it correctly. You could face prosecution and a fine of up to  $\pounds 5,000$  if your waste ends up being fly-tipped.

Fly-tipping causes a lot of problems. It costs tax payers and landowners to clear it up, threatens humans and wildlife and damages our environment.

- **Suspect** if in doubt don't let anyone take your waste, you could be fined if its fly-tipped
- **Check** for their waste carriers registration number and note down the number plate of the vehicle
- Refuse cold callers always carry out your own research
- Ask questions about what is going to happen to your waste.
- Paperwork make sure you get a receipt

# Thank you for our help!

All over the UK, Lions Club members head to the streets of their local county to collect donations on behalf of the Marie Curie organisation. Our Oadby & Wigston Lions were no different and in just two days, and with the help of the generous shoppers on Bell Street, Wigston, they raised £550.





Universal Credit is a new benefit that is administered by the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP). For working age claimant's, it will replace: Tax Credits, Job Seekers Allowance (Income Based), Income Support, Employment Support Allowance (Income Related) and Housing Benefit.

On June 13, 2018, Universal Credit goes live in Oadby & Wigston. This means, if you make a new claim on or after this date, you will claim Universal Credit instead of the benefits listed above. If you have already claimed or receive any of the benefits listed above then you won't need to do anything for now as these benefits will continue. If you have a change of circumstances after 13 June, 2018 you will be advised if you will need to claim Universal Credit.

### I'm a pensioner, will it affect me?

Universal Credit does not apply to single claimants of pension age or where both members of a couple are of pension age. In these cases, claimants will continue to claim Pension Credit and/or Housing Benefit.

However, where you are a member of a couple and one of you is pension age and the other one is working age you will be able to choose between claiming Universal Credit or claiming Pension Credit/Housing Benefit.

### Can I claim if I am working?

Yes. Whether you qualify will depend on your income and not the hours you work, so if you receive Universal Credit and move into, or out of, work, your payments will be adjusted and you won't need to make a new claim, as long as you still qualify.

### How do I claim Universal Credit?

You will need to make a claim online. Support will be available from the Council or job centre if you do not have access to a computer, tablet or smartphone, or if you need help in completing the claim.

# When will I get paid Universal Credit?

Universal Credit is paid a month in arrears and you should receive your first payment five weeks after you claim. Payments will be made direct to your bank account.

If you can't wait five weeks for your first payment, you can ask for an advanced payment loan, but be aware that this will need to be paid back each month over a maximum of twelve months.

# Additional Support

If you need help managing your money, please contact the Council or the work coach at your job centre.

# Will Council Tax Support be included in my Universal Credit?

No, you will need to claim Council Tax Support separately. You can do this online, by visiting the Customer service Centre or by calling the Council. Any Council Tax Support award will be credited to your Council Tax bill. You will be responsible for paying your Council Tax.

# Will free school meals be included in my Universal Credit?

No, these will need to be claimed separately via Leicestershire County Council or at your children's school. Some academies may not provide free school meals.

### **Discretionary payments**

If you claim Universal Credit, and you pay rent and/or Council Tax, you can still claim for Discretionary Housing Payments (DHP's) or Discretionary Council Tax Support from Oadby & Wigston Borough Council.



# Renting your home

This section applies to Council Tenants and Housing Association Tenants as well as tenants of private landlords. Rent is known as 'housing costs' under the new Universal Credit scheme. You are responsible for paying your rent.

### How do I pay my rent?

Whether you are a Council Tenant, tenant of a Housing Association or a tenant of a private landlord, when you receive Universal Credit your housing costs will be included in the one lump sum payment each month. This differs from Housing Benefit and will require you to pay the rent from this amount.

You should speak to your landlord to make arrangements such as setting up a direct debit and speak to your landlord immediately if you get into difficulty with your rent payments.

### Can my rent be paid direct to my landlord?

Yes, but only in limited circumstances such as if you are vulnerable, have difficulty in managing your finances, or have rent arrears of eight weeks or more. Please speak to your landlord and/or contact the Universal Credit team as they may be able to arrange this.

# **Greater Wigston Historical Society**

## The Lancaster Crash

On Monday February 4, 1946, a Lancaster Bomber fell from the sky and crashed into a ploughed field in Wigston, just yards from properties in Long Street, Leicester Road and Aylestone Lane, and just missing children in the Long Street Modern School - now All Saint's C of E School. Each year the anniversary of the crash is marked by pupils with a short service and performance by the children.

The ill-fated Bomber was flown by airmen of the 300 Polish Squadron, RAF. It was thought that the aircraft was hit by lightning, after which the pilot, Wing Commander R. Sulinski DSO. DFC. guided the plane into open fields to avoid buildings in the village – consequently killing everyone on board.


